c1820 **Born** at St Lukes, London, Middlesex, England.²

23 November 1840 Tried at the Central Criminal Court (Old Bailey), London, England indicted for larceny in stealing on 20 April 1840 1 gown value 10 shillings, 1 petticoat value 1 shilling, 1 pair of boots value 9 pence, and 1 cloak value 10 shillings from John Gore, a coachman, resident of New Road, Sloane Street, Chelsea; found guilty; sentence 7 years transportation; aged 20.³

Statement of witness Lucy Gore:
*I am the wife of John Gore, a coachman; we live in New-road, Sloane-street, Chelsea. On the 20th of April, I went out from half-past eight o'clock in the evening till nine – I locked my door, but left the key in it – when I returned I missed the articles stated, and the door was unlocked – this property is mine – (examining it.)*³

Statement of witness James Bradle, Police Constable B 134:
I have a pair of boots and a gown, which were pawned, but the pawnbrokers are not here, they gave them up – I found this petticoat on the prisoner.
*Prisoner's Defence. A person asked me to buy those things, and I pawned them in my own name; she gave me a pint of beer and the duplicate for my trouble; I gave her 6d. for the petticoat.*³

Statement of witness John Bradley:
*I produce a certificate of the prisoner's conviction, which I got at Clerkenwell – [This examination had taken place on the 19th of May, which was previous to the offence in question] – the prisoner is the person.*³

5 April 1841 Departed Woolwich, England on the *Rajah*.⁴

19 July 1841 Arrived at Hobart on the *Rajah*.⁴

c24 July 1841 Upon arrival at Hobart, sent to Launceston for assignment.⁵

11 December 1841⁶ **Died** at Launceston.⁷
