Tried at the Central Criminal Court (Old Bailey), London, England indicted for larceny by a servant in stealing on 19 August 1840 1 gown value 1 shilling, 2 petticoats value 10 shillings, 2 pairs of stockings value 4 pence, 1 shawl value 2 shillings, 1 half sovereign, 1 crown and 2 half crowns, the property of her master William Philip Godfrey; found guilty; sentence 7 years transportation; aged 16.3

Statement of witness Mary Godfrey:

I am a laundress, and am the wife of William Philip Godfrey, of Paddington – the prisoner was four weeks in our service, and twelve months ago she lived with us also. On the 19th of August I went out about eight o'clock in the evening, leaving her in care of the house. with my daughter, who is eight years old – I returned at eleven o'clock, and she was gone – she had taken off her own clothes, and put on these articles, which belong to two ladies who I wash for – she knew they were not my own – the shawl, stockings, and money are mine – these are what I missed – (looking at them) – the dress is quite new, and she has cut it about – I had given her strict orders to pay this money to the landlord when I left that night – she left her own clothes in the middle of the room.³

Statement of witness Patrick Conolly:

I am a policeman. From information I apprehended the prisoner on the morning of the 28th of August -I told her I wanted her for stealing a gown, two petticoats, other articles, and some money - she said, "I acknowledge to have taken the gown and petticoats, but I did not take the money" -I found the skirt and sleeves of the gown on her, the body was found at her lodging.³

Statement of witness Frederick Leighton:

I am a pawnbroker, and live in Lisson-grove. I have a petticoat which was pawned for 2s., I believe by the prisoner.³

Statement of witness Charlotte Lowe:

I keep a clothes-shop. On the 21st of August the prisoner sold me this petticoat for 1s. – she had it on her back, and said she was in distress – I asked her four times if it was her own – she said it was.³

I did not take the money, she gave her daughter orders to pay the rent.³

Statement of witness Mary Godfrey:

Mary Godfrey re-examined. My daughter is not nine years old – I told the prisoner the

money was on the shelf, if the person should call.³

Newspaper report:

James Malden, a very decent-looking man, was charged with feloniously receiving a silver watch, knowing it to have been stolen, the property of Samuel Morley.

It appeared that the prosecutor's house, in Collins-street, had been broken into during his temporary absence on the 4th of May last. On the 16th of this month [October 1844] he received intelligence from Mr. Cole (of whom he had originally purchased the watch) that it had been brought there to be repaired by Mr. Brady, the Police Clerk, to whom it had been given for that purpose by his female servant, the wife of the prisoner. There being no evidence to convict the prisoner with the receiving, he was Acquitted.¹¹

Newspaper report:

HORSE-STEALING.

Robert F. Landells was arraigned for stealing a mare, the property of Samuel Morley, who deposed that the prisoner hired the mare on the 10th of September lasat, and promised to return it the same afternoon. As he did not return it, he lodged information, and a warrant was issued for the prisoner, who was arrested in Melbourne. William Sperling deposed that he purchased the mare from the prisoner about the 12th Sept., at Kilmore. The prisoner, in his address to the jury, stated that he hired the mare from the prosecutor, having to visit some friends; and seeing in a newspaper which he accidentally met with, that a trial in which he was concerned, was coming on sooner than he expected, he pressed on to Kilmore with the intention of proceeding to Melbourne. He could not get a messenger to send the horse back, and thought it better to sell it with the intention of refunding its value to the prosecutor. He had met Mr. Harney in Melbourne, and told him the circumstances. Mr. Harney deposed that he saw the prisoner in Melbourne about the 13th inst., when he stated that he rode to town on a hired horse. After he was arrested, he told him that the horse got tired, and he sold him. His Honor charged the jury, and pointed out that the only question which they had to consider was, did Morley give the prisoner any authority to sell the horse? Messrs. Devine, Brown, and Conolly deposed to the previous good character of the prisoner. The jury returned a verdict of guilty, and the prisoner was sentenced to six years on the roads.²¹

Verdict: died in his bed suddenly from disease of his heart and inflammation of his lungs.³⁵

Statement of witness John Lacey:

This Deponent John Lacey this 18th day of July 1872 on his oath saith, I am a labourer and gardiner residing at the deceased Samuel Morley's place at his outhouse.

I have been working in the deceased's garden for the last five weeks, close to his house, and saw everything which passed and was done about the place. About three of the oclock on Tuesday evening the 16th instant, the deceased was in the garden with me talking about getting some green feed sown for his horse. I advised him not to stop out he seemed so ill. Then about 7 oclock, by moonlight, I was at the stable when he insisted upon our putting his horse under the dray to go home, for he would not then believe he was at home, although his son tried to persuade him that he was, yet deceased wanted to have some tea and sugar, bread and oats with chaff for the horse put into the dray and that he could drive to the bush, he got into the dray, Thomas with deceased and the horse, and then deceased seeing he was at home turned to the house and they got him into the kitchen. I saw no more of him until Thomas his son told me his father was dead, and I went and saw him lying dead on his bed yesterday morning about 5 oclock. The evidence of Jane Morley and her son I believe to be correct, as far as I saw since I came there Mrs Morley was not unkind or inattentive to the deceased. She had not been drinking much since her husband got so ill, or for some days, she never left the house and she attend well to him night and day. Deceased was not hurt in any way. If he had been he was the very man to tell all about it.³⁵

Statement of witness Thomas Morley:

This Deponent Thomas Morley this 18th of July 1872 on his oath saith, I am a son of the deceased Samuel Morley a Gardiner residing at Strathfieldsay – District of Sandhurst.

I was at my father's on ere yesterday the 16th in the evening, and finding father at the stable door, and wandering his mind. I felt he was very ill, he made me put the horse under his dray and he then got into the dray by my help. I had to do so to please him, he drove as far as the gate, but I persuaded him he was at home which he at first would not believe. After some little time I got him off the dray and into the house to his chair. Seeing father so, I went to Sandhurst for Doctor Atkinson, but he was out at a confinement case, his brother said he

would send the doctor out here when he came home. I got a soothing draught from Mrs John Atkinson and when I got back I gave half of it to father and got him into bed, but he grew quite deranged in his mind and I remained at the house but fell asleep until about two oclock when my mother called me saying father was dying. I got up and found him dead. My mother was up attending to father, and was then quite sober.

She was always good to him, and he to her tho' he had a quick temper. I did not think he was so bad a white before I went for the doctor, he said he did not want a doctor, that he would be able to go to work in the morning – yesterday. He had plenty to eat and drink and any necessary comforts, but he was a hard working man day after day he would be out in his shirt sleeves in all weathers – and lately he would insist on working in the heavy rains. I never heard him complain of his heart only a cold and short cough and hard to breath when working much.³⁵

Statement of witness Jane Morley:

Jane Morley: This Deponent Jane Morley, this 18th day of July 1872 on her oath saith, I am widow of this deceased Samuel Morley a Gardiner, residing at his late residence, Strathfieldsay, District of Sandhurst.

The deceased Samuel Morley viewed dead by this jury was my husband, he was 56 years old, and had been a healthy man generally until quite lately when he only complained of shortness of breathing for which he got some medicine. He had been a hard working man and did not drink much. Thursday week he got a chill at work in a garden, and had not been well since. On Saturday I went to Dr Atkinson's and told Mr John Atkinson how deceased felt, and as the Doctor was not at home he gave me something for the cough my husband complained of which the doctor had previously given him some of. Up to Tuesday evening the 16th instant deceased had been about as usual, but a little excited, about or between six and seven oclock, after he had some tea and toast, he became more excited and quite delirious, and about 8 oclock my son Thomas went for doctor Atkinson although deceased said he did not want the doctor, who was not at home when Thomas got to his house. He Thomas returned about 11 oclock with a draught to sooth deceased who took it and lay down in bed to sleep, but he did not sleep, he wandered in his talk and grew worse until he died at two in the morning – yesterday. He had every attention and nourishment he required. I was not prepared for his death which I think came very suddenly on him. I was quite sober all the week past and he could not complain of want of attention, the forman of this jury is my next neighbour and knows I did not neglect him so do other jurors here, besides my husband would have everything he desired done for him, he had no hurt or fall.³⁵

Statement of witness Dr Harry Leigh Atkinson:

The Examination of Harry Leigh Atkinson M.D. &c residing at Sandhurst, Colony of Victoria taken on oath this eighteenth day of July A.D. 1872, at the South Atlas Hotel ...

I have known the deceased Samuel Morley for some years, he was a gardener. I have occasionally prescribed for him for dyspepsia and liver complaint. I have not seen him for a few weeks but prescribed for him an expectorant on Saturday last. When sent for on Tuesday night to come to the deceased I was from home professionally, and when informed of his death yesterday morning I did not expect it, and could not certify the cause of it. I have made an examination of his body. I found a large quantity of serous effusion in the right pleura. That lung had pneumonia in the third stage. There was considerable old standing disease of the aortic valves, and hypertrophy of the heart, which was the cause of the rapid and fatal result of the pneumonia.

There were no marks of violence upon the body. The liver was congested. The body was well nourished.

The cause of deceased's death was pneumonia and disease of the aortic valves with hypertrophy of the heart.

I had no suspicion deceased drank over much stimulants and always saw him sober, he worked very hard in all kinds of weather.³⁵
