Born at Woolwich, Kent, England.²

23 November 1840

Tried at the Central Criminal Court (Old Bailey), London, England indicted for larceny in burglariously breaking and entering the dwelling house of Francis Boott about 12 midnight on 22 October 1840 at St George, Bloomsbury with intent to steal and stealing therein 11 spoons value £2, 1 teapot value 4 shillings, 1 table cover value 3 shillings, 1 tablecloth value 2 shillings, 1 counterpane value 4 shillings, 1 shawl value 5 shillings and 2 books value 2 shillings, his goods; 2 gowns value 6 shillings, 1 pair of boots value 5 shillings and 1 petticoat value 1 shilling, the goods of Sarah Chapman; and 5 gowns value 16 shillings and 3 petticoats value 5 shillings, the goods of Elizabeth Chapman; found guilty; sentence 10 years transportation; aged 21.³

Statement of witness of Sarah Chapman:

I am servant to Francis Boott, of No. 24, Gower-street, Bedford-square, in the parish of St. George, Bloomsbury, it is his dwelling-house. On the 22nd of October I went to bed, between ten and eleven o'clock – the parlour-window and all the house was fastened – I got up about a quarter to seven o'clock – when I came down I perceived the street-door open, and missed the articles stated, some of which are mine and some my master's – the parties had got in at the front parlour window, and out by the street-door – I have known the prisoner some time – she was in the habit of coming to see me, but she never went in further than the hall, to go down into the kitchen.

*Cross-examined by Mr. Clarkson. Q. How long have you known the prisoner? A. From my childhood – we were brought up together – I never knew any thing against her – she is the daughter of poor people, who live at East Grinstead, in Sussex.*³

Statement of witness of William Jones:

*I am a pawnbroker. On the morning of the 23rd the prisoner pledged these seven spoons, and other articles – I asked who she came from, she said from her aunt, who kept a lodging-house in Charles-street.*³

Statement of witness of Spencer Lee:

*I am a pawnbroker. I produce a table-cloth, pledged on the 23rd of October by a woman – I do not recollect who.*³

Statement of witness of Richard Avant:

I am a pawnbroker. I produce a gown and other things, pawned by the prisoner on the 23rd of October.³

Statement of witness of Sarah Chapman:

Sarah Chapman re-examined. This table-cloth and other things belong to my master – this gown is my sister Elizabeth's – these boots are mine.³

Statement of witness of Rebecca Crowe:

My husband lets lodgings. The prisoner took a lodging of us on Tuesday, the 4th of October – she was out all night on the 22nd, and I let her in about ten minutes to seven o'clock in the morning of the 23rd, with a large bundle – I said it was a very wrong thing of a young woman to stay out all night, and mine was a respectable house, I should not allow it – she said she been to a labour all night with a cousin, and that these things belonged to her sister; and she took them from her cousin's, thinking they would not be safe there, as they had got a nurse.

Cross-examined. Q. Do you know any thing of any man she was in the habit of associating with? A. She told me when she took the lodging, that her name was Loveless, and she was about to be married – I never saw the man till the Saturday after she was taken – he is not here, he is with his father and mother-in-law, in Park-street.³

Statement of witness of Walter Dalgeish:

I am a policeman. I took the prisoner into custody on the night of the 23rd, at No. 16, North-street, Manchester-square, where she lodged – I had found part of the property at the different pawnbrokers previously – I found a tea-pot, a flannel-petticoat, three white petticoats, and a pair of boots which the prisoner had on, which Chapman claims – next morning, as I was conveying the prisoner from the station-house to the justice-room, she asked if I had taken the man into custody – I said, "What man?" – she said, "The man I told you of" – I said, "You told me of no man" – she then said the man had got in at the parlour-window, let her in at the street-door, that they both went down into the kitchen, folded up the goods, and took them away about daylight in the morning.³

- 5 April 1846 **Son** Richard Edward Callow and **daughter** Mary Jane Callow, twins, born at Hobart; mother Sarah Lucas; informant father James Callow, carter, resident of 45 Murray Street, Hobart.¹²
- 5 May 1846 Husband James Callow impounded 1 black she kid in the public pound, Elizabeth Street, Hobart; resident of Murray Street, Hobart.¹³

- 17 June 1852 Husband James Callow hired probation pass-holder Bridget Cleary (*John William Dare*) for 12 months at £8 per annum; , resident of Murray Street, Hobart.³³
- 23 September 1852 Husband James Callow hired probation pass-holder Bridget McNamara (*Martin Luther*) for 12 months at £7 per annum; resident of Murray Street, Hobart.³⁴
- February 1856 Husband James Callow a signatory to an open letter to John Leslie Stewart petitioning him to be nominated for a vacant office on the Hobart Municipal Council.³⁵
- April 1856 Husband James Callow listed as a person entitled to be placed on the electoral roll for the return of a member for the Legislative Council for the electoral division of Buckingham; resident of Cascade Road, Hobart, freeholder, house and land.³⁶

Newspaper report:
ALLOW V. DAVEY. – James Callow charged John Davey with assaulting and beating him. Plea not guilty.
Complainant deposed that defendant was painting the Culloden on the slip, and witness went there to ask for a debt due to him for twelve months, when he told him he would pay, when he could: he asked if he would let him have part of it when he had done that job, he said no: and after further talk between them he told him he would not pay him at all: witness said he would try and make him, upon which Davey caught him by the shoulder jobbed him against the bulwark, and threatened to knock his eye out if he came to him for money.
Cross-examined. – You did not tell me not to scandalize you; nor did you lay your hand on me in a social way.
George Hewritt, debt collector, who was present at the time of the assault, gave corroborative evidence.
Defendant denied the assault and said all he did was put his hand on Mr. Callow's shoulder, and desire him not to expose him before the whole of the men. He neither pushed nor struck him.
He called two witnesses.
*The Bench considered the assault proved, but as it was not serious they only inflicted a fine of 20s.*³⁹

Newspaper report:
TASMANIAN SILK. – There is at present to be seen on the premises of Mr. James Callow, at the corner of Warwick and Harrington-streets, a collection of samples of silk spun in Tasmania, which would well repay the trouble of an inspection to any persons taking an interest in this possible future industrial resource of the island who do not possess the opportunity of seeing specimens of it elsewhere. The samples completely fill a box of about 15 inches by 12 inches, are estimated to weigh from six to seven ounces, and are the produce of

some 2,000 worms, the offspring generated by half a dozen of their prolific race since the summer of last year. The silk though apparently not of the finest quality is very neatly made up and taken altogether reflects much credit upon the juvenile members of Mr. Callow's family by whose care it has been brought into existence.⁴¹

23 November 1867 **Died of phthisis pulmonalis at Harrington Street, Hobart; aged 47, grocer's wife, born England; informant W Clarke, undertaker, Elizabeth Street, Hobart.**⁴²

The death rate during the past four months has been very low, only four persons having died, their average ages being 59 years. Amongst these are two old familiar faces. Mr. James Callow, who died at the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. E. P. Eginton, on the 29th July, aged 66, was a well-known city man. He was one of the oldest members of the Manchester Unity, I.O.O.F., and was buried by that fraternity in Hobart Town on Thursday last.⁶¹
